tour to the USA and Canada at the end of 2013, there was the possibility that whatever followed would be a bit of an anti-climax. Luckily, the New Zealand Festival in Wellington was next on the calendar and this feast of artistic activity never fails to raise expectations and energy levels. The North American tour marked the end of the current NZ Youth Choir's three-year cycle and auditions had been held the previous September for the 2014-2016 choir - this resulted in one third of the choir being new members. In parallel with this, Voices NZ Chamber Choir's current and prospective members auditioned at centres around the country. So, both choirs started afresh in 2014. Choirs Aotearoa's two choirs' contribution

to this year's NZ Festival was a joint recital, and the premiere of a commission. Earthquake strengthening had robbed the Festival of two of the city's favourite choral venues, Wellington Town Hall and St Mary of the Angels Church. As a result, the NZ Youth Choir and Voices NZ Chamber Choir found themselves in the unusual setting of the Wesley Church in Taranaki Street for their joint concert. It proved to be a fairly dry acoustic and the combined choir of 66 singers and their conductors, Karen Grylls

to choreograph carefully their stage moves between each piece. Nevertheless, the concert, 'Sounds and Sweet Airs', settings of William Shakespeare's texts for a celebration of the Bard's 250th anniversary, was warmly received. A premier of a major work is always exciting and a large audience gathered in the Cathedral

of St Paul to hear Voices NZ Chamber Choir, the NZ String Quartet, taonga pūoro artist Horomona Hora, and tenor Richard Greager under the baton of Karen Grylls. The staging, supervised by Jonathan Alver, was positioned in the centre of the Cathedral's nave. Voices performed items by Purcell, Messiaen, and Schnittke and the NZ String Quartet played Beethoven's Molto Adagio Op. 132 before the premier of 'Requiem for the Fallen' by Ross Harris and Vincent O'Sullivan. NZ Listener reviewer, Elizabeth Kerr, wrote of this joint Choirs Aotearoa/NZ String Quartet Trust commission: "Impeccable performances by choir and string quartet captured the anguished pain and beauty of the work. Operatic tenor Richard Greager as an old soldier personalised the story, producing real chills as he met his old "cobber" in the Memento Mori." Members of the audience were very moved by this poignant work, the first of many events to commemorate World War I.

Many in the group also presented a concert in the Classical Expressions series in Expressions Arts and Entertainment Centre in Upper Hutt in October. The programme comprised 2014 repertoire with several solo items from members of the choir and a virtuoso piano contribution from Isaac Stone. Another Wellington gig was to entertain guests at the Wellington Airport Community Awards at the Marae in Te Papa in November. A spectacular event was in store for the Auckland members of the NZ Youth Choir in

November with the invitation to appear on stage

with the Rolling Stones at their Mt Smart concert. The long-time favourite, 'You can't always get what you want', was an encore and the choir's involvement had to be kept strictly secret. When the concert was postponed from its original date in April, the singers had to hold their tongues for another seven months until the night of the concert, 22 November! As choir member Natasha Wilson said on the 'Breakfast' TV interview "... we were bursting by the concert." Appearing in front of 37,000 Stones fans was an extraordinary and exciting experience for these young singers, and they were cheered and applauded. Voices NZ Chamber Choir was also moving in unfamiliar circles when its new CD 'Voice of the Soul' was nominated in the Best Classical CD category in the Vodafone NZ Music Awards. In

Also In November, Voices NZ and Karen Grylls set off on a week-long visit to Australia. This was only the second time that the choir had crossed the Tasman, the first being with

the NZSO for the 2000 Sydney Olympics Arts Festival. This time, Voices gave a recital in the Eugene Goossens Hall at the ABC Centre in Sydney which was broadcast live across Australia on

the Classic FM network, with a simultaneous relay via satellite on Radio New Zealand Concert — an estimated Australasian audience of over 100,000 listeners. The programme entitled ... of the Virgin and the Bard', featured songs dedicated to the Virgin Mary and settings of Shakespeare's poems. The choir then moved on to Melbourne where they performed a lunchtime concert in St Paul's Cathedral. A schools workshop and conductors' workshop were followed by an evening concert in St Paul's with Polyphonic Voices, a Melbourne-based chamber choir under the direction of Michael Fulcher. For the performance entitled 'Magnificat', the two choirs provided individual contributions to the first half of the programme

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n March 2015 the Auckland Arts Festival will host the first north of the North Island performance of 'Requiem for the Fallen'. Commissioned by the Choirs Aotearoa NZ and New Zealand String Quartet Trusts with financial support from Creative New Zealand, this work by Ross Harris and Poet Laureate, Vincent O'Sullivan, was premiered in Wellington at the NZ Festival last February

and repeated at Arts Festival Dunedin in October. It is a powerful and moving

35 minute dramatic work that pays homage to the many who surrendered their

lives for our country particularly in the 1914-1918 Great War. The work is uniquely Kiwi with taonga pūoro performer and composer, Horomona Horo, providing a spiritual context for Harris' music, O'Sullivan's poems and the Latin text. The critical acclaim has been unanimous and audience reaction overwhelming. This is a 'must go' event in the Festival calendar. In 2012 NZ Youth Choir joined the NZSO National Youth Orchestra for a performance of the work in Christchurch following a joint residential course. The five spirituals embedded in the work, arranged

for a cappella choir by the composer, have become something of a party piece for NZYC and they make a regular appearances in concert programmes.
