

a construction industry consultant specialising in performance measurement and management,



James is one of New Zealand's leading players of historic keyboards

(harpsichord, clavichord, fortepiano and organ), and a key figure in the Early Music scene. He has an active performing career, both in this country and overseas. James is also Head of the Early Music Department at the School of Music at Auckland University and a member of the baroque chamber ensemble, Extempore. His extensive discography includes recordings of English organ music, Bach harpsichord works, North German organ music and the complete François Couperin organ masses. Formerly Director of Music at Auckland's Holy Trinity Cathedral, he is now Organist & Director of Music

at St Patrick's Cathedral, Auckland. James established the vocal ensemble, Voices of the Age of Discovery, in 2011 and the group is rapidly gaining a reputation for its outstanding performances of Renaissance polyphony.
