IN THE SOUTH

A South Island Diary of the New Zealand Youth Choir's visit to Dunedin and Christchurch.

SUNDAY, 31 AUGUST: Fog and technology disrupted my careful planning for the NZ Youth Choir's arrival into Dunedin. The Auckland plane circled the Southern Alps for 40 minutes before heading back to Christchurch to refuel and return to Dunedin. TRANS-TASMAN TOUR

In November Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir cross the Ditch for a week-long visit to Australia for only the second time in the choir's 16-year history.

In 2000, the female chorus of Voices NZ collaborated with the NZSO for a performance in the Sydney Olympic Arts Festival, so a return to the vibrant concert scene of our large neighbour was long overdue.

In 2010, at the end of their Asia/Australia tour, the NZ Youth Choir performed a live broadcast for the ABC from the Eugene Goossens Hall in Sydney. Going out on the ABC Classic FM network and relayed simultaneously on Radio New Zealand Concert, this was a collaborative first for these two radio stations. Not to be outdone, Voices NZ under the baton of Music Director, Karen Grylls, is broadcasting a time from the ABC on Monday, 10 November at 8:00pm Sydney time, which can be heard via satellite on Radio NZ Concert at 10:00pm.

The programme, entitled '... of the Virgin and the Bard', features songs of the Virgin Mary and Shakespeare's texts set to music to celebrate the 450th anniversary of the Bard's birth. Alongside works by Rachmaninov, Schnittke, and William Mathias will be pieces by Kiwi composers, David Childs, Andrew Baldwin, and David Hamilton. By special request, as a contribution to Australian Music Month, an Australian item is included, Andrew Ford's 'Chimney-Sweepers'.

The tour party will then move on to Melbourne to perform a lunchtime concert in St Paul's Cathedral on Wednesday, 12 November at 1:00pm. The next day, Voices travel out to Brighton to give a schools workshop at Firbank Girls' Grammar, where New Zealander, Philippa Jones, is Co-Director of Music. Karen Grylls and the choir will also participate in a conductors' workshop under the



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aegis of the Australian National Choral Association.

On Saturday, 15 November, Voices NZ join forces with Polyphonic Voices, a Melbourne-based chamber choir formed in 2013 under the artistic direction of Michael Fulcher. Choral supporters will remember Michael as Organist and Director of Music at the Wellington Cathedral of St Paul and Music Director of the Wellington Orpheus Choir. The two choirs will provide contributions to the first half of the programme and after the interval come together to sing J. S. Bach's Magnificat in E-flat, BWV 243a. A fitting end to Voices' Australian tour!

CLASSICAL EXPRESSIONS

The New Zealand Youth Choir in Upper Hutt's concert series.

Following in the illustrious footsteps of Barry Douglas, Pascal Rogé, Michael Houston, the NZ String Quartet and many more internationally acclaimed musicians, the Wellington-based members of the NZ Youth Choir form a 20-voice chamber choir to perform in the Classical Expressions Concert Series in Upper Hutt on Monday, 13 October. The concert, in the Genesis Energy Theatre at Expressions Arts & Entertainment Centre, starts at 7:30pm.

The Choir will present a selection of works from the NZYC's 2014 repertoire. To honour the Shakespeare anniversary, the programme has a number of items using the Bard's texts and the concert also includes a wide range of music from a double-choir 17th-century motet by Peter Philips to a contemporary setting by choral super-star Eric Whitacre of E.E. Cummings' 'Little Man in a Hurry'.

Among the traditional spirituals being performed are the five incorporated by Michael Tippett into his oratorio 'A Child of Our Time'. The performance, conducted by Music Director, David Squire, will include a kapa haka number especially written for the NZ Youth Choir and, as a souvenir of its 2013 tour to the USA and Canada, George Shearing's 'Lullaby of Birdland'.

REQUIEM IN DUNEDIN

On Sunday, 19 October, South Island concert-goers will have their first chance to experience the Ross Harris/Vincent O'Sullivan commission, 'Requiem for the Fallen', in commemoration of World War I. This will feature the New Zealand String Quartet, Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir, taonga puoro composer Horomona Horo, and tenor Richard Greager, under the baton of Karen Grylls. The Dunedin Arts Festival has promised its patrons that the Town Hall will be reconfigured in a dramatic and unique way by director Jonathan Alver to stage this work.

John Button, *Dominion Post* reviewer, described the premiere in the NZ Festival in February this year as 'An unforgettable performance', and Elizabeth Kerr in the *NZ Listener* said 'Impeccable execution by choir and string quartet captured the anguished pain and beauty of the work'.

Staged choral works are an expensive exercise and our colleagues in Dunedin have been very brave in undertaking this task, making it a 'Don't Miss' opportunity.
